This Masterclass will be a virtual tour of the <u>Morgan Library & Museum</u>'s exhibition <u>She Who Wrote:</u> <u>Enheduanna and Women of Mesopotamia, ca. 3400–2000 B.C.</u> Participants will view highlights from the exhibition, engage in conversation based discussion of the objects, and read selections of Enheduanna's poetry in translation.

Participants will gain a better understanding of the lives and rights of women in 3rd millennium Mesopotamia, as well as the writing of Enheduanna, the first author identifiable by name in human history.
