Uncovering Secrets of Animal Mummies in Ancient Egypt

Introduction to Reading Group:

This course aims to equip educators with modern skills and methods to teach students about the historical significance of animal mummies in ancient Egypt. It focuses on uncovering the religious purposes of animal mummification and providing specific learning strategies for teachers. The course covers topics such as the sacred practice of animal mummification, animals as deities and symbols, types of animal mummies, pets for the afterlife, famous animal necropolises, animal behaviors, mass production for religious trade, and the mummification process. Furthermore, it emphasizes the role of animals in ancient Egyptian life and how to simplify the concept of animal symbolism in Egyptian art for young students. Educators will gain valuable insights into incorporating rich examples of animals in daily life and eternal life within art and architecture into their classroom teachings. Participants will explore topics related to animals in the Egyptian environment, including mummies, coffins, and offering food. Instructors will be able to learn and practice using online resources and exploring animal burials at archaeological sites. The course welcomes those curious about unraveling the mysterious secrets of the animal world in the past. A variety of tools will be used, such as images, video clips, virtual tours, articles, books, and specialized websites. The course offers a passionate journey through time to delve deeply into the mysterious world of animals.

Reading Group Objectives:

- To equip the educators with the wide knowledge and various resources to present the role of animals in ancient Egyptian art, and in the afterlife.
- To develop the skills and tools of teaching the real symbolism of animals in ancient Egypt, and animal behaviors in art inside the classrooms in order to promote important use of topics that connect the past to the present.
- To gain understanding the types of animals' mummies: votive mummies, sacred mummies, offering animals as food, and interpreting all the data they should present.
- To estimate the critical thinking of the evolution of how the ancient Egyptians were influenced by secrets of animal role in religion theories.
- To simplify the mythology of rescuing god Osiris by the crocodile Sobek, and how it was incorporated into historical narratives in the religion myth.

Week 1: Recognizing the surrounding Egyptian environment of animals in art. Objectives:

- Exploring Ancient Egyptian Natural Environment and Animal/human Connections, The Role of Animals in Ancient Egyptian Life
- The study explores the natural landscape and environment of ancient Egypt It highlights the connection between wild and pet animals, plants, and food
- Specifically, it focuses on the Nile Valley culture from predynastic period to new kingdom period
- Examples such as the Ancient Zoo at Hierakonpolis are provided
- Animals like cats, dogs, monkeys, oxen, donkeys, horses, cattle, sheep, goats, fish, and fowl played crucial roles in various aspects of ancient Egyptian daily life.

Week 3: Animal Mummies: A Sacred Practice in Ancient Egypt

The focus is on leading students to have serious discussions about the purposes and eternal life of mummies, the mummification process, and famous necropolises of animal mummies in a specific context, the participants will be able to identify the different tools of how to present data of animals' mummies to the adults and kids in classrooms, and also the types of animals' mummies, and the purposes behind worshiping the animal's power in afterlife.

The ancient Egyptians had a deep reverence for animals, often associating them with specific deities or using them as symbols in their religious beliefs. This reverence extended to the afterlife, leading to the practice of mummifying animals.

Ancient Egyptian Animal Mummification

- Animals were mummified as offerings to gods and as votive offerings
- Beloved pets were mummified to accompany their owners into the afterlife
- A mass production industry emerged for animal mummies as religious offerings
- The mummification process for animals was similar to humans, but often simpler
- Famous animal necropolises include Saqqara and Tuna el-Gebel

- Some hieroglyphs were based on animal forms.
- Animals were used in personal names and were linked to occupations and social status.
- Practical use of animals included professions like hunters and herders.
