Classical Sci-Fi and Fantasy

This Reading Group primarily, we will be reading <u>The True Story by Lucain of Samosta</u>. This novel, composed in the 2nd century CE, is widely considered the oldest work of science fiction (or fantasy, or speculative fiction depending on who you ask). I hope that you all leave this class with new perspectives on speculative fiction, a greater appreciation for the ancient world, and some book/TV/ movie recommendations.

I wish to leave a reminder that, while I am professionally knowledgeable about the Roman World, I am merely an enthusiast with speculative fiction. The commentary texts and essays I provide are not necessarily an absolute truth. Everyone's got something to contribute here, everyone brings their own geek expertise to this table. Week 3 (To the Moon) Reflection Activity: Comparative Moon Voyages Main Reading:

The True Story by Lucian of Samosta Book 1 (pp. 55-97 in this edition. Please note this is a bilingual Greek-and-English text, so it's only about 20 pages of reading. If you want to read in Greek, have fun!)

<u>Somnium, seu opus posthumum De astronomia lunari</u> - Johannes Kepler A bit of Latin. Kepler is not as long as the blog makes it look. Yes, this is the same Kepler who came up with the laws of planetary motion. The story is semi autobiographical as well.

Optional Readings:(Not required but these are fun!)

<u>Le Voyage dans la Lune - Georges Méliès</u> - an early (1902!!) Sci Fi film.

<u>The Other World: or the States and Empires of the Moon (L'Autre Monde: ou les États et Empires de la Lune)</u> - Cyrano de Bergerac (Yes he was a real person. He also apparently thinks Canadians are aliens.)

<u>The Unparalleled Adventure of One Hans Pfaall</u> -Edgar Allen Poe <u>The Origins of Science Fiction Criticism: From Kepler to Wells (JSTOR)</u>
